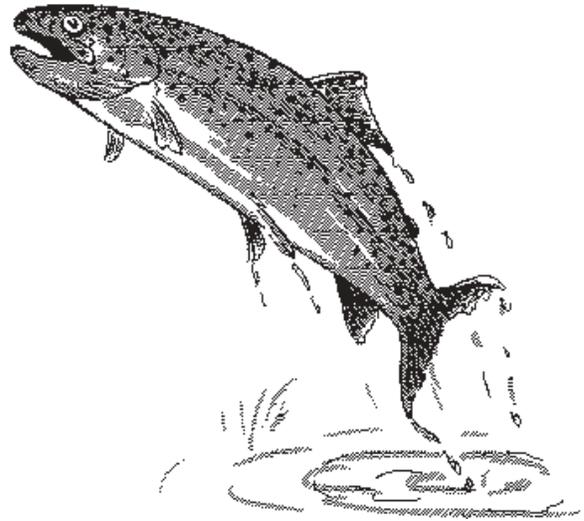

From The Prez,

Spring came early this year and, as such, we had our first "last Friday of the month" free fishing day of the year at Buchanan Ponds on March 26th. About a dozen ETU'ers fished, mainly late afternoon/evening, and caught a number of fish -- even a few on top with dries. We'll have several season passes and day passes available at our upcoming auction for those of you who want to ply those waters more often. Obviously the auction and general fund-raising for the Bear Creek project are taking most of our time lately.

The board has been meeting at least every other week to continue making all the arrangements. I want to thank the 6 or 8 new folks who've been helping out. Actually the attendance at the board meetings outstripped our last venue, so we've moved them to the AG Edwards offices. Thanks to Randy Huiting for opening that up for us. By now I'm sure you've heard about the auction, but I'll reiterate for those who are new. It will start at 6pm on Saturday April 24th, at the Hiwan Country Club in Evergreen. Tickets are \$20, and will garner you some tasty food stuffs (cash bar), a great program featuring the renowned retired federal wildlife agent Terry Grosz (Yes, the one that was on Animal Planet!), and a chance to win one of our great door prizes (winner need not be present) -- an Orvis rod outfit, a guided trip on private water, and a signed collection of Terry's books. Western Public Lands Oil & Gas Development

Introduction

Ongoing efforts to expedite energy development on public lands have turned traditional multiple-use management on its head by elevating oil and gas exploration to a dominant position. As a result, gas and oil development is occurring at an unprecedented rate throughout the Rocky Mountain West, affecting tens of millions of acres, in some of the wildest places -- with some of the best hunting and fishing -- in the United States. The cumulative effects of this development spread throughout such a large landscape, and proposed on such a large scale, will almost certainly have significant impacts on fish, wildlife, water, and hunting and fishing.

The purpose of this report is to document some of the linkages among the places that people hunt and fish on public lands and areas most likely to see dramatically expanded energy development. If armed with good information, the hope is that hunters and anglers will pay closer attention to these threats, and get involved.

Threatened Fisheries

More than 50 percent of our nation's healthiest, most prized trout streams originate on public lands. But many of these crucial waterways face an uncertain future thanks to, among other things, coal bed methane development, which can harm water quality and quantity. Coal bed methane development removes groundwater in order to access trapped gas seams. This water is generally pumped to the surface, dumped into rivers and streams, or stored in ponds. In some places, produced water pumped from coal seams is higher in sodium content than surface water, and may be unsuitable for irrigation, wildlife, fisheries and native plants. And with each coal bed methane well producing up to several million gallons of water per year, there is concern the industry could seriously deplete scarce groundwater sources throughout the arid West, as well as reduce crucial surface water and stream levels. Still, in other areas, there is concern about pumping too much produced water into streams, altering natural flows and affecting aquatic plants, insects and fisheries.

Portions of Wyoming's famed Green River, Colorado's San Juan River and Montana's Tongue River are among the trout fisheries threatened by gas and oil development.


