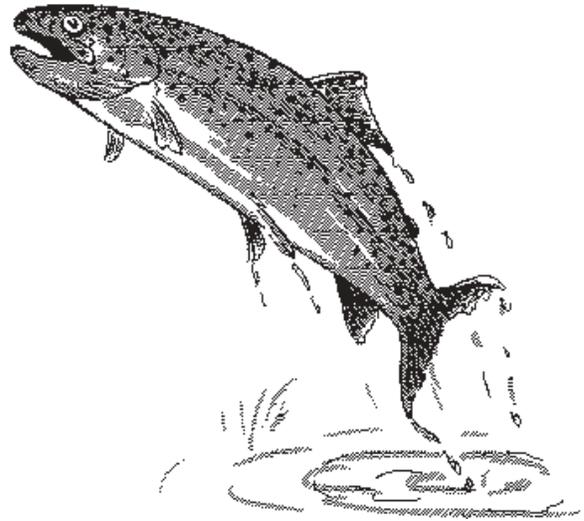

O'Fallon Park Dedication

Saturday morning, September 24th marked one of the last chapters of ETU's Bear Creek Restoration Project. Thirty-five persons attended including approximately 21 TU folks. We spent the first part of the morning cleaning up the stream within the park, as part of CTU's Statewide River Cleanup. That was followed by a formal dedication of the project and unveiling of the new kiosk. Steve Murray then served refreshments (the usual prime rib and caviar) and t-shirts were presented to the cleanup crew.

Attendees outside ETU included Sharon Lance (CTU President) and her husband Mark, Jim Guthrie (CDOW Fishing is Fun Grant Administrator - among other titles); A J Tripp-Addison (Denver Mountain Parks Superintendent.), Jude O'Connor (DMP Natural Resources), and Scott Bostick (DMP Ranger); Gil Hassinger (CTU Area VP); four officials from TENAS; Mel Nuchols (Evergreen Chamber of Commerce President); and more.

It was great to finally close out this major undertaking, **unofficially, the second largest stream restoration project ever done by TU in Colorado**. All that remains is to wrap up the video and some media stuff. We will continue to monitor/replace shrubs (if needed), water as needed, and then late next fall ('06) we will remove the barrier fencing.

Hats off to all of you who helped make this happen. Special thanks to Troy Thompson (Project Lead), Hugh Gardner (Inspiration, video/media, etc.), Steve Murray (Major paperwork!), and Hal Garwood (metal sign stand). Please don't feel slighted by my singling out these folks -- so many of you contributed financially through our fundraisers and with direct donations and/or help on the work days, but there are just too many to mention here. Hopefully, your reward will be in seeing the changes to Bear Creek.


ETU Proudly Presents....John Fielder

On Saturday, November 12th, Evergreen Trout Unlimited will present Colorado's premier nature photographer, **John Fielder**, and an evening of spectacular photography and stories. The program will be held at the **United Methodist Church of Evergreen**, beginning at 7:00pm. Doors will open at 6:00pm, and tickets are available from ETU Board members, and (if there's any left) at the door, for \$10 each. Admission includes the program, refreshments, and entry in the door prize drawing. There will also be a silent auction.

John Fielder has worked tirelessly to promote the protection of Colorado's open space and wild places. His photography has influenced people and legislation, earning him awards from many major conservation groups, including the Sierra Club's Ansel Adams Award. He was an original governor-appointed member of the Board of Great Outdoors Colorado, which uses lottery profits to protect open space and wildlife habitat. He speaks to thousands of people each year to rally support for land-use and environmental issues. John is the photographer of more than 30 exhibit-format and guidebooks, all but four about Colorado. His newest book, *Colorado 1870-2000 II*, is a sequel to the best selling *Colorado 1870-2000*. In 1998, acclaimed Colorado nature photographer Fielder drove 25,000 miles and backpacked another 500 in order to stand exactly where his 19th-century counterpart, William Henry Jackson, stood. From 300 different 19th-century Jackson photo locations, Fielder pointed his camera in the same direction as Jackson's, in order to manifest the change in Colorado's landscape over a century in time. Only 156 of these original then-and-now photo pairs made the cut for the first book.

Seven years later, the rest of the project finally sees the light of day in *Colorado 1870-2000 II*. Arguably this portfolio of 108 repeat photographs is more scenic and more colorful than that of the first book, yet just as historical. From Denver to Georgetown and Aspen to Mesa Verde, the change in Colorado's most historic towns and settlements will amaze, if not shock, you. On the other hand, many of Jackson's venues still look the same today...

Join us for this very special evening which will also include books for sale and a book signing. See you there!

TU Applauds Open Rivers Initiative

Trout Unlimited (TU) is applauding the Department of Commerce's creation of a grant program designed to remove barriers to fish passage in communities nationwide, calling it "a progressive initiative with phenomenal potential to restore our home waters."

Announced at the White House Conference on Cooperative Conservation, the Open Rivers Initiative will provide funds through the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) to help towns tear down obsolete dams and improve the many culverts that block fish attempting to swim upstream.


"Given significant, secure and continued funding," said Chris Wood, a TU vice president, "the Open Rivers Initiative could make a much-needed contribution to our nation's overall aquatic health. We have seen the resurgence of life that followed dam removals in waters like Maine's Georges and Wisconsin's Onion Rivers, so we know that such efforts can lead to positive change. And we can't wait to see the improvement in fish populations that will follow a series of small dam removal projects in communities country-wide."

NOAA estimates that there are 2.5 million dams across the country, many less than six feet tall and some up to 200 years old. The Open Rivers Initiative will target dams where community consensus and the dam owners support removal, the dam no longer serves a useful purpose, and removal will have the greatest benefit to anadromous fish like salmon, striped bass and shad.

"One of the beauties of this program is that it can address troubled stocks of native, sea-run fish while improving water quality and boosting local economies, by increasing the numbers of anglers and boaters drawn to an area," Wood said.

The idea for the ORI originated in part from discussions held regarding the current plan for the removal of dams on Maine's Penobscot River. Upon its completion, the Penobscot project stands to make a major contribution to the recovery of the endangered Atlantic salmon, shad and striped bass. "On the Penobscot, we created a replicable model for cooperative river restoration, and in the ORI, we anticipate and welcome the means for replicating the model over and over again," Wood said.
