

We are looking for some more members not necessarily to hold an office or be a board member but possibly to help with a committee or with planning special events. I know there are some of you who would like to participate more, but maybe not on a monthly basis like the people above. Please take advantage of some opportunities that may come up in the future.

Some of you might have heard we were planning a Fielder event this spring. Because some of the powers that be and even our ring leader, Gary Rotolo, are going to be out of town on the date of the proposed spring event, we decided to cancel the spring Fielder program and to reschedule it this fall. We are planning to hold some small fundraisers in the meantime. There have been some suggestions of fly-fishing package raffles for either equipment or trips. We will definitely consider any suggestions for fundraisers and invite volunteers for our fundraising committee. I know there are some of you that have had experience raising money for organizations like ours. If we have some continuous activities to help with ETU's kitty, we will be better prepared to take on a good project.

Please take note of several items coming up on our calendar. First will be our spring clean-up of Bear Creek that is usually scheduled for late April. The second event is our Buchanan Youth Fishing Camp scheduled for Saturday, June 21st. This event has special importance for ETU. We get to work one-on-one with youth in the area to help cultivate future fly-fishers and Trout Unlimited members. We also cultivate our relationship with the Evergreen Park District that allows ETU free days on Buchanan Ponds. We need a bunch of volunteers to help during the day as well as volunteers who will be willing to donate flies for the kids. We will publish what flies are needed. You do not have to be a fly-tier; most of us have plenty of flies in our boxes. If you donate two dozen flies, we will put you on the volunteer list for 2008 so you can take advantage of the free days at Buchanan Ponds.

New people actually may not know the rules for ETU's free fishing days at Buchanan Ponds. Old members may need a yearly refresher. I will again try to explain the rules as clearly as I can.

1. To be eligible to utilize ETU's free days.
  - You need to be an ETU member
  - You need to have volunteered for an activity such as river clean up, youth days, board member, donating flies (as mentioned above), etc.
  - At each event, there is a leader with a list that you need to sign and date. It is your responsibility, not the leader's, to make sure you are officially signed

in for the event. The volunteer list is periodically published in the newsletter. If you volunteered and you are not on the list, contact John Haile or me. If you show up to fish one of the free days at Buchanan Ponds and you are not on the list, you will not be able to fish for free that day, period! John and I are not always available and the Rec. District will not allow free fishing if you are not on the list. (You may ask why I am being so stubborn about this. Well, last year, one person fooled us. He not only was not a volunteer, he was not even a member of ETU. We have over 400 members and I do not know all of you by a long shot.)

- You are eligible from the date you volunteer through the following year. (Example: If you participated in one of last year's Bear Creek clean-up events, you were eligible for the rest of 2007 and are also eligible for all of 2008. If you choose not to volunteer in 2008, you will not be eligible for 2009 until you volunteer again.)
  - I truly hope that, as a member, you will not volunteer just one time to get free days at the ponds. This privilege is intended for members who truly believe in and support ETU's mission. It is a way of thanking you for all your hard work.
2. Here are the Buchanan free days that the Evergreen Recreational District gives us for running the Youth Fishing Clinic (June 21st) and the Fourth of July fishing for Kids event at Evergreen Lake. We can use all the help we can muster for these events. If you enjoy the free days, I would like to see you volunteer for at least one of these events. Here are the days:
    - The first Friday of the month.
    - The third Friday of the month or the adjacent Saturday. You may pick either the Friday or the Saturday, but not both. An example of this is March this year. The actual free days that month will be the first Friday the 7th and the third Friday the 21st or Saturday the 22nd. Clear as mud. The best thing to do is to check the newsletter calendar.
    - This gives you two free fishing days a month, a \$40 value. Let's say you fish Buchanan Ponds at least 5 months a year. That means you save 200 bucks! Please note: Buchanan Ponds are definitely not your average ponds.

Please do not volunteer just for the free days. Volunteer because you want to support ETU!

Are you getting antsy for this winter to end? I know I am. That ground hog saw his shadow, but I do not think he would have seen it here. If you are one of those individuals who get to fish during the winter, Mike Goldblatt would

### The Evergreen Trout Fishing Report

*Where have YOU been fishing lately? Let Mike Goldblatt know at [mike@lamtree.com](mailto:mike@lamtree.com) or give him a call and let him know about your latest trip.*

Our second cold winter in a row brings us frozen rivers and lakes right now. Following are the flows on tailwaters in Colorado, as well as some information on the Green River tailwater below Flaming Gorge Reservoir:

S. Platte River at Trumbull 133 cfs  
 Williams Fork below W. Fork Reservoir 66 cfs  
 Blue River below Dillon Reservoir 52 cfs  
 Taylor River below Taylor Reservoir 75 cfs  
 Fryingpan River below Reudi Reservoir 123 cfs  
 Yampa River below Stagecoach Reservoir 74 cfs

The **Green River** below Flaming Gorge Reservoir in extreme northeast Utah is a spectacular fishery that all western fly fishers should experience. This tailwater is just below Flaming Gorge Dam near the tiny hamlet of Dutch John, Utah. It takes about 6 hours to get to the river from Evergreen. There are some incredible hatches; notably the spring baetis hatch, an elusive hatch of giant cicadas that sometimes appears around May or June, caddis and PMD's in the summer and great terrestrial and streamer fishing in the late summer and fall. If that is not enough, the scenery is incredible, especially in the upper section usually referred to as Red Canyon. The Green is described in three sections: A, B and C. The A section begins just below the dam and is by far the most popular stretch. The beautiful 1000 - 2000 foot tall canyon walls are a distraction to the fisherman and oarsman. During the warmer months it is crowded with anglers and recreational boaters. This section is loaded with trout, including the naturally reproducing browns as well as stocked rainbows

and cutthroats that grow quickly in these rich waters. Red Canyon is most often fished from a drift boat or raft. But there is a trail for the wading angler that runs the entire seven mile length from the dam to the Little Hole takeout. In 1996, a 30 pound brown was caught in this section! Section B runs from Little Hole to Indian Crossing, about 8 miles. This reach gets much less pressure than the A section, and is my personal favorite. The only way to access most of the B is by boat, and the shuttle is rather long because the river leaves the road, But it's worth it to get away from the crowds; and the browns and cutthroats are big and healthy. There is a difficult rapid where Red Creek enters about halfway down, but it is passable with careful rowing. The first three miles of the B section fish pretty much like the A section, but once Red Creek enters, the water can turn off-color depending on precipitation. The C section, flowing through the very remote Brown's Park, is overlooked by most, and is difficult to access. But some big fish reside there. There is plenty of lodging available for the fly fisher near Dutch John. My favorite spot is Red Canyon Lodge. There are also camping sites. If I could only fish one river in the west for the rest of my life, I believe I would choose the Green.

### 2008 Kids Fishing Camp: Buchanan Rec. Center June 21, 2008 9:00 am - 3:00 pm

This will be our Third Annual Buchanan Ponds Fishing Camp for boys and girls ages 7 through 14. A general outline of activities includes:

- an introduction to angling ethics
- a quick class in simple leader knots
- a terrific but brief DVD on entomology coupled with a pan full of live bugs fresh from the pond
- a dazzling demonstration of various casting techniques
- an absorbing demonstration of fly tying by several ETU members
- an actual fishing-by-the-students session
- a great picnic lunch and rest break on the recreation center patio
- a concluding fishing session
- closing awards ceremony

#### How's that for a fun day?

Now we need about 24 volunteers to serve as overseer coaches for the fishing time and to serve the picnic lunch. And we will need 5 or 6 fly tying demonstrators. The ETU Board has approved a full "Volunteering Member" credit

4 for any person contributing 2 dozen flies to the program so that the tying demonstrators don't have to furnish all the flies the kids use up in their sessions on Buchanan Pond.

We plan to focus on the smaller upper pond where a heavy stocking of catchable fish is scheduled for Tuesday before the event. The shore of this pond offers better back cast terrain for the kids, and a smaller water volume may improve their possibilities for success.

The Recreational District furnishes a neat tee-shirt for each youngster and Hal Garwood makes a nifty wooden trout name badge for each registrant! ETU furnishes the picnic lunch food, rods, reels and flies as well as coaching faculty.

### Fly of the Month: Split-Foam-Back Baetis

This month's fly is an original created by some of the guides who regularly work the Gray Reef section of the North Platte River up in Wyoming, including Bob Dye out of the Blue Quill Angler. Bob says it was a group effort, but its economical shape looks nothing like the work of a committee.

The main thing is that Bob swears this baetis fly works on the big fish up there and that he has found it also works really well on the rivers around here - the South Platte and the Roaring Fork to name a couple.

Bob, by the way, is one of the top guides at the Blue Quill, specializing in trips to the North Platte. He's also a great choice for the Roaring Fork.

This fly is relatively easy to tie. Bob says the secret is to keep it thin, just like we hear from tiers with so many of the baetis patterns. You can fish it as an emerger in the film or fish it deep, so it is a good versatile pattern for your fly box.

Here's the recipe:

**Hook:** TMC 2487 (The one shown here is a #20; think small.)

**Thread:** Tan or Gray 8/0

**Body and legs:** Tan mallard flank fibers. Substitute other colors if you don't have tan.

**Rib:** Gold Wire, x-fine (Lagartun brand is the thinnest)

**Wing case:** Black Foam - 2 mm wide x 1 mm thick strip

**Split back:** Pearl Flash, small size

### Tying Instructions

Remember that one of the goals is to keep this fly really thin, so try not to waste any extra turns of thread as you tie. Also, keep your wraps really smooth. Start by tying on your thread mid-hook and working your way back to and down a little onto the bend of the hook. Bob says that on most baetis imitations he doesn't go onto the bend of the hook, but this one is different.

Next, select a cluster of fibers from a mallard flank feather, probably 12 to 20 fibers, depending on the size of the hook. Straighten the fibers so the tips are even and then tie in so that the tips extend beyond the end of hook just enough so that if you bend them down, they are flush with the bottom of the hook. Do not clip the butt ends. Leave them hanging over the eye for now. You will use them later for the body and the legs.



Tie in the gold wire at the back where you have tied in the mallard fibers. Be careful to use very few wraps and very even wraps. You will trap the mallard feathers along the top of the hook as well as you move the thread forward to the point of the hook, but no farther.

Now take the gold wire and wrap it forward with wraps roughly 1/16th of an inch apart. Tie off where your thread was stopped earlier. Again, be careful to use no unnecessary wraps. Keep it thin.



At this point, tie in the pearl flash right on top so that it is just about in the middle of the hook. Leave it hanging there, pointing over the bend of the hook. Wrap your thread up to the eye of the hook, capturing the mallard feathers in the process and leaving the rest of the feathers hanging out over the eye of the hook.

Tie in the thin piece of black foam in front of the pearl flash, with the thinner edge lying along the top of the hook and the thicker part up. First make a couple of wraps at the tip of the foam strip just behind the eye of the hook and a couple more just behind the pearl flash. A longer piece of the foam will hang back toward the bend of the hook. When you tie down the foam this way, that will cause the foam to pop up in sort of bulb between the pearl flash and the eye of the hook. Take some shape scissors and trim off the top of that bulb. Then use a few wraps of thread over the trimmed piece to create the thorax.



Now pull the trailing piece of foam forward over the thorax and tie it down behind the eye of the hook with a couple of wraps. Next, pull the pearl flash forward over the foam and tie down, making sure it is pulled snugly before tying off. This is the same thing you do when tying a flashback pheasant tail.

All that remains is to deal with the mallard feathers that still hang out over the front of your hook. Divide those in half. Pull back the half on the far side so those



now are pointing back along the side of the hook toward the bend and tie down with a couple of wraps behind the eye of the hook. Do the same with the other half, except along the near side of the fly. This time use three tight wraps and tie off.

Whip finish. Trim the legs to about 1/8th of an inch or so. Finally, put a drop of cement on the fly to secure it really well. Enjoy!



***Additional Note:** Since this fly was created especially for the Gray Reef section of the North Platte, Bob notes that he will be guiding a three-day/four-night trip there Oct. 26-30 for eight people. It will be a drift boat trip using four guides and is being arranged through the Blue Quill. ## Notes from January Board Meeting

Subsequent to the board meeting, acting president Ken Wilbert submitted his resignation effective immediately after getting a ruling from his employer, the Bureau of Land Management, that the position would present a conflict of interest with his management job.

Following Ken's announcement, former president Hal Garwood said he would be willing to step in for another term. In an e-mail vote conducted over the first weekend in February, the board voted to nominate Hal for the position of president and to submit his name to the membership at the February meeting.

Hal also agreed to preside over the February meeting in Ken's absence, serving as interim president until the position is officially filled. Other ETU officers up for election/re-election are:

Vice President - Open  
Secretary - John Haile  
Treasurer - Steve Murray

Tim Stechert has agreed to continue as the News Editor in charge of the newsletter. Randy Huiting has agreed to continue as Programs/Membership chair. And Karen Christopherson has agreed to continue as Webmaster, among other things.

Other items of note:

It was agreed to pursue a fundraising event with author/photographer John Fielder for 2008. Gary Rotolo had been in discussions with Fielder's office about an event in late April. The board later agreed to try for a fall event, giving ETU more time to put together a significant accompanying auction or other complementary fundraising opportunity.

John Haile reported that he and Karen Christopherson had decided not to contest the state's proposal to remove Bear Creek from its list of endangered waters. The formal hearing will be Feb. 11. ETU along with Colorado TU will still testify to make the point that the stream still has problems, particularly with temperature, that need to be addressed.

The decision not to contest the "de-listing" of the stream was based on continued improvements in the number and overall weight of brown trout in the stream since the major fish kills of 2002. One concern we will note in the Feb. 11 hearing is that those numbers were actually down in 2007, however, so the long-term trend is still uncertain. The stream will be up for review again in two years.

(Note: On Jan. 21, Karen, John, Mike Goldblatt, Ken Wilbert and Troy Thompson, who is an ETU member and stream engineer, met with a group from Evergreen Metro District to talk further about a possible silt trap on Cub Creek as a way to limit the silt coming into Bear Creek.

(Because of the cost of building a silt trap from scratch - probably a minimum of about \$75,000 - we agreed to look first at whether we might be able to make use of some existing weirs on Cub Creek and Bear Creek, and just maintain those. We will still look at possible sites on Cub Creek for building a silt trap, too. We also are going to approach the highway department about working with us on whatever we do to see if part of the plan can include having them construct some barriers to keep winter sand from being pushed into the streams. We'll keep you updated.)

It was agreed that, as usual, there will be no July ETU general meeting and program.

There was a lengthy discussion of the electronic newsletter and concerns that many members may not be seeing the newsletter each month because they either do not have email or fail to open their email. As a result, the board agreed to run a phone campaign to contact all those members with no recorded email address. Also, we will probably do one mass mailing of a printed newsletter dur-

ing the year to the membership just to make sure everyone gets at least one piece of communication and include in that a prominent piece referencing the electronic newsletter.

## CTU Seeks Applicants for River Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp

*(CTU reprint)*

Colorado Trout Unlimited, a nonprofit organization dedicated to conserving, protecting and restoring Colorado's coldwater fisheries and their watersheds, is now accepting applications from students aged 14 to 18 for its third annual River Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp. Applications are available online at [www.cotrout.org](http://www.cotrout.org) and must be received by March 30, 2008. The camp, scheduled for June 8th - 13th at the Peace Ranch near Basalt, Colorado, is designed to educate students on the importance of coldwater conservation and provide hands-on fly fishing instruction.

The River Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp is limited to 20 qualified students who will be selected based on their qualifications and a written essay on why they would like to attend the camp.

"Our goal is to inspire a new generation of conservation advocates," says Camp Director Mike Nicholson. "We've structured a program to serve as a foundation for natural resource stewardship. The students will be actively engaged in learning about clean water, healthy watersheds, fish and wildlife. They will meet and interact with people who are professionals in the field. This is an opportunity for these young people go back to their schools and communities and share what they've learned and support river and stream conservation for a lifetime."

Camp classes will include: principles of ecology, hydrogeology, aquatic vertebrate and invertebrate sampling, hydrology, trout behavior, trout stream entomology, the biology of pollution, acid deposition, and politics of conservation and human effects on the Rocky Mountains. In addition, the camp will include hands-on classes such as fly tying; fly casting, streamside ethics, angling literature, streamside botany, wader safety and survival, and the evolution of an angler. Students will also participate in a watershed project to restore habitat in a nearby stream.

The River Conservation and Fly Fishing Youth Camp includes faculty from various environmental fields and state agencies such as the Colorado Division of Wildlife, Department of Environmental Protection and National Forest Service. The cost to attend the six-day camp is \$375, but financial assistance is often available.
